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

Many of you will have received letters about your child's attendance over the last week or so. Please note that attendance is not measured in days, but sessions. Each school day equals two sessions—one in the morning and one in the afternoon. The Department for Education and the Local Authority are asking schools to take various steps to improve attendance and these letters are one way in which we do this. This is a core part of our work and sending out letters to notify parent/carers of their child's attendance was something that was done routinely before the pandemic and will be done again. We are aware of all of the reasons for absence and these letters are sent for parents information even when a child has been absent from school due to sickness. The local authority may advise us that school attendance panels are the next step to monitoring attendance. These are meetings in which parent/carers are asked to attend with Education Welfare Officers and other professionals like the school nurse and are often held when illness is the main cause of absence. When the school is closed for strike action or for other reasons beyond our control, then the number of possible sessions that can be attended is adjusted so that this is not counted in your child's attendance. It is our statutory duty to monitor and improve the attendance of our pupils and to promote excellent attendance and punctuality. Absence during term time will rarely be authorised. We encourage parents to ensure their child is on time for school as arriving late can be disruptive to other pupils in the class when staff are diverted to manage pupils who are late or have to revisit what has been missed. I thank you in advance for your ongoing support to improve our school attendance figures.

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Some of you have shared concerns about the situation in Turkey and Syria. I am going to be speaking with the School Council at our next meeting about our charitable work and how we can support the Earthquake appeal.
